In the Roman pantheon, the god Janus ruled over doors and transitions – the liminal spaces between one place and the other. Representations of Janus have two heads, with one looking to the front and the other to the back. This is why he gives his name to the first month of the Roman year, January, which stands between one season and the next, an in-between time that looks both to the future and the past.

Six months after we announced the cancellation of our 2020 seasons at Camp Ramah in Wisconsin and Ramah Day Camp in Chicago, we are moving out of our own "January," having closed the books on the Emergency Campaign which, thanks to you and more than

2,000 (!) other supporters of our work, has allowed us to weather a disruption of our core product in a way unimaginable a year ago. The way we traversed the storm of this past spring and summer, the proverbial rainbows and lemonade our community made out of stormy skies and more than our fair share of lemons, remain worthy of celebration even as we fully shift our attention to the 2021 summer.



And what will that 2021 summer hold? First and foremost, we are confident that we will be able to offer in-person experiences for campers and staff in both Wheeling and Conover next summer. As I write this, the specifics of those experiences remain up in the air as we wait for additional iterations of guidelines and remain hopeful that meaningful changes in the COVID-19 dynamics will alter the situation. The great news is that, of the small fraction of overnight camps that operated last summer, a good number were successfully able to limit COVID-19 spread among their population, leaving both medical and camp professionals with a playbook to run responsibly camp next summer. The same narrative is true of day camps. We view last year's parameters as a likely worst-case scenario: we hope that developments in medicine, technology, public health protocols, and the way the virus is impacting our communities next spring will mean that our camps

will look more similar to the pre-COVID iterations. We continue to work with our accreditor, the American Camp Association (ACA), the National Ramah Commission, and a variety of other relevant organizations and camp colleagues to determine how to deliver effectively wonderful Ramah experiences in 2021 to, God-willing, approximately 1,000 Jewish children, teens, and young adults! We will begin providing regular updates about our COVID-19 protocols and what we believe camp will look like in 2021 by mid-December.

What we do know today is that, without a doubt, our offerings in 2021 will cost more than they have in the past. Our economy has suffered and Ramah families will need greater scholarship support. We will likely need to invest significantly in medical supplies – testing capabilities, personal protective equipment (PPE), and more. We may have to limit our capacity and/or invest in additional facilities upgrades at the recommendation of our public health advisers. We may need to rent additional buses for either or both of our camps. Fluctuations in supply chains will impact the cost of foodstuffs and cleaning supplies. The list goes on.

The questions about next summer – about so much of our lives – can feel overwhelming. Our senior team is currently focusing on prioritized tasks in three areas, two of which we need your help with. First, we are working to enroll campers for 2021 - over 475 as I write this. Second, we are designing, with COVID, budget, and other logistics in mind, the best Ramah summers we possibly can for next year, delivering what we hope is a summer of double-impact: two times the fun, two times the ruach, two times the transformation. And third, we are working to raise the funds to cover our rising expenses and ensure our current financial stability continues. Our professional team and dedicated expert volunteers will take care of running camp; we need your help in spreading the word about the unsurpassed product we offer, connecting us to families interested in joining the Ramah family, and helping, through your own generosity, asking others to give, or connecting us to prospective donors and foundations.

Years ago I learned from our head chef the restaurant industry adage — "you're only as good as your last meal" — particularly appropriate for a camp kitchen serving roughly 2,000 hot meals a day to a demanding crowd. Our 2019 summer was phenomenal, our enrollment for 2020 was trending up with great energy and momentum when we got derailed by, God-willing, a once-in-acentury pandemic. Knocked down, we got up, dusted ourselves off, and performed miracles in community-building, content-delivery, and fundraising. Now we turn our eyes to the future, where we know there is only one way to judge the coming year: we're only as good as the 2021 summer is going to be, and it's gonna be great!

Every year on Tisha B'Av, I have flashbacks to my days at Ramah. It is odd that alongside all of the amazing memories of fun, sports and outdoor adventures, I also remember what is regarded as the saddest day of the Jewish calendar. Perhaps it has something to do with this "holiday" being the only one observed over the summer months. Or maybe it feels so different than every

other day at camp that it sticks out. I know for some people, their only experience of Tisha B'Av is what happens at camp.

This year was no exception. As I was walking to shul on erev Tisha B'Av, I could envision (i) the lighted path created by the Nivonimers holding candles to guide us from the Chadar Ochel to the Bet Am, (ii) sitting on the floor back to back with a friend, flashlight in hand, and (iii) the special somber melody of Eichah, the chanting from the Book of Lamentations. But on this night, when the reading of Eichah began, I was struck by the opening line:

אֵיכָה יָשְׁבָה בָדָד הָעִיר רַבָּתִי עָם

Alas! Lonely sits the city once great with people!

All of a sudden, instead of thinking of the past, I was picturing the present and what our campsites in Conover and Wheeling looked like at that moment - a vacant kikar, a quiet Bet Am, an uninhabited tree house, a calm lake and empty cabins. Our two camps, once filled with laughter and energetic kids, were now desolate and idle. No sounds of splashing or bouncing balls or Hebrew being spoken. The home away from home for so many was sitting empty and lonely.

We all had our moments of feeling sad and frustrated at the loss of our traditional summer. But what transpired in the wake of the cancellation was powerful and inspiring. Our professional staff, led by Jacob, summoned their energy, creativity and passion, and built outstanding online programming. We proved once again that exceptional informal education is a hallmark of Ramah. These Zoom calls reminded so many campers that camp is still there for them. In order to strengthen the sense of community and provide some semblance of a normal summer, we sent our annual T-shirts to campers and staff as well as a newly revised Ramah songbook to encourage moments of ruach and Shabbat celebration.

Many personal interactions were also taking place initiated by Ramahniks on their own. Counselors took the time to reach out to each other and to former campers for one-on-one calls. Alumni reconnected with camp to learn how Ramah was responding to all that was going on. Our staff trainers made themselves available to help with anyone going through a particularly difficult time. Various eidah reunions were initiated on their own, leading to renewed friendships after many decades. This is exactly what we try to cultivate at camp - a sense of purpose, belonging and responsibility to each other that lasts a lifetime.

Nothing illustrates this sense of community more than the tremendous financial support that you, our Ramah donors, provided during this time. When the Board of Directors made the decision in May to close camp for the summer, we immediately launched an Emergency Campaign. The broad response was incredibly reassuring. We give our heartfelt thanks to the parents of our current campers, so many of whom donated all or part of their 2020 camp tuition. A large group of parents rolled over their tuition to next summer. There were also families who enrolled their children for the 2021 season, a critical part of our planning. We are so grateful for the outpouring of support from our camper families.

Generous response to our Emergency Campaign also came from our alumni with a record number of people donating for the first time. Many made gifts in addition to their annual pledge in recognition of these extraordinary times. Parents and grandparents of alumni joined in as well, remembering the impact camp had on their children and grandchildren and wanting to make sure those experiences would continue. This was certainly a multigenerational effort for which we are proud and thankful.

We also acknowledge all of our organizational partners that contributed to our campaign. Many synagogues made meaningful contributions even though they may be facing their own financial challenges. A number of charitable foundations continued and expanded their support for our camps, both in helping us plan and in direct financial support. Our camps also received funds from local Federations who understand the need and the role Jewish summer camping plays in strengthening our Jewish communities. These strategic partners all helped us through this challenging period.

As we navigate current uncertainties we look forward to filling our camps once again. What we have seen is that our community is resilient and that there is a tremendous amount of love for Ramah and respect for what we do. With your ongoing help, we will make sure that our home away from home will never be empty or lonely again.

Countdown to Summer 2021!

We are gearing up to open both Camp Ramah in Wisconsin and Ramah Day Camp next summer and are making plans to operate safely and at near-full capacity. Over 350 campers enrolled at CRW and 110 enrolled at RDC are already counting the days to camp!

As we plan for the 2021 season, the health and safety of our campers and staff is our first priority. We will continue to work with our medical committee, our COVID-19 task force, and local and state governments to help guide our planning. We are all counting the days until our virtual programs transition to in-person experiences!

Virtual Camp Experiences!



The Great Mental Fog of 2020, also known as this pandemic season, has a remarkable ability to blur the front view as well as the back. It is all the more extraordinary to remember the sheer creativity and dedication that marked this past summer.

In May, with the brainstorming efforts of Elissa Hoffman (Rosh Drama '20), we developed a programming idea that would recreate one of camp's most beloved traditions. The first-ever virtual **Machazemer Medley** was born, featuring singing, choreography and musical accompaniment from typical camp Hebrew musical productions. So how did we create an engaging, physically distanced musical experience? We delegated! Program Director Annie Glasser turned our ideas into practical solutions, including

creating a poll for the kids to vote on song inclusion. Elissa led the campers in drama games and script-reading rehearsals, encouraging them to bring their energy to the screen. Irit Gavze (Rosh Rikud '20) created choreographed videos to each song, complete with costumes, to inspire the campers to have fun with their roles. And that's just the beginning, because I vastly underestimated the amount of work this was going to be.

Through the months of planning and execution, I had the opportunity to work individually with each camper. During zoom rehearsal, their smiling faces never failing to cheer me up. Our conversations, while mostly about lyric pronunciations or musical structure, sometimes veered to stories about their makeshift summer plans, camp, and their friends. It was a rare glimpse into their non-camp lives, while doing virtual camp things. It lent a depth all the more poignant to their video submissions.

In all, the Machazemer Medley included a vast cross-section of Camp Ramah in Wisconsin, from campers to former *mishlachat* to staff to parents of campers. Each submission is a story, a measure of sincerity, and a moment of what could have been. In piecing them together, however virtual the result, we glimpse the binding ties of camp community. 
